

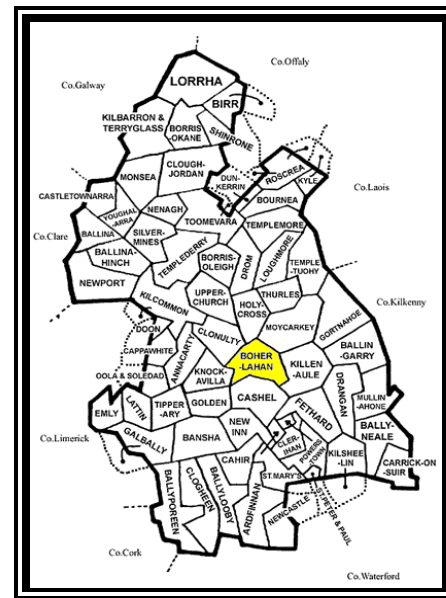
Maloughneys of New Brunswick

7.1 PATRICK MALOUGHNEY

In the cemetery at Belledune, New Brunswick, on a windswept point that juts out into the Baie of Chaleur, there is a tombstone that reads:

Sacred to the memory of Patrick Maloughney who
 departed this life May 29, 1853, age 72 years
 Also his wife - Mary Ryan who departed this
 life December 25, 1844, age 63 years
 Natives of Cashel, Co. Tipperary, Ireland

Both Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan were born in 1781 - and were a long way from home for people who had been born in the fertile valley of Tipperary. Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan were not actually born in Cashel - but gave the name of the nearest centre or market town, as the place of their birth. Actually Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan lived in the Parish of Boherlahan about six miles from Cashel.

The books of the Parish show the following children born to Patrick Maloughney and

Mary Ryan (after 1810):

Mary	Born 1813
Catherine	Born 1815
Thomas	Born 1818
John	Born 1821

As a consequence of the famine of 1827 Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan left Tipperary, and set out across the sea to Canada. They took with them only John, the baby - the rest either died prior to the move or were old enough to look after themselves.

It is interesting to speculate whether these were the parents of the Michael Moloughney who fathered the Moloughney line of Fallowfield. The following points are helpful.

1. The parents of Michael Moloughney were also called Patrick and Mary (deduced from the Irish custom of naming children after the grandparents).
2. Family legend of the Fallowfield Moloughneys has it that one brother settled in the Maritimes (this might have been John).
3. The Parish Register of Boherlahan begins only in 1810. Michael was born in 1809 and therefore would not have been found in the Records. It is believed that a Patrick, Edward and Daniel Moloughney were brothers of Michael (since they stood for the baptism of three of his children); they might also have been born prior to 1810, and therefore not appear in the Records of Boherlahan. Patrick Maloughney (born in 1781 according to the inscription on his tombstone) certainly was old enough to have fathered three or four children before the Church records began in 1810.
4. We definitely know they left behind Mary, Catherine and Thomas (or else they had already died), and it is not beyond the realm of conjecture to suppose that other children, born earlier than 1810 and therefore the eldest in the family could also have been left behind.
5. Boherlahan is only about 25 miles from Urra Hill where Michael Moloughney raised a family, and it is not beyond the realm of possibility that he and his brothers might have already left home and made their way to that area prior to Patrick and Mary departing for the New Land.
6. It is assumed from Land Records in New Brunswick that Patrick and Mary left Ireland

about 1827/28 to go to Canada and at that time Michael would have been 19. If the foregoing assumptions are correct then his brothers would have been still older - all fully capable of looking after themselves.

7. The names used by Michael for his children, have similarity to the names used by Patrick and his son John in New Brunswick. This strongly suggests that there was a tie-in at a level not far removed. See the section dealing with "Relationship of the Fallowfield and New Brunswick Moloughneys"
8. The question might well be asked as to why Michael Moloughney did not go to Belledune when the time came for he and his wife to leave Ireland in 1850 and head for life in the New World. It has been determined from various land records of New Brunswick that Patrick Maloughney had had several crop failures, and experienced difficulty in acquiring sufficient money to pay for the land he was occupying. Therefore he presumably did not have money to send back to Ireland to pay for the passage of any of his children that might be trying to flee the famine conditions that existed in those years. On the other hand however, the sisters of Michael's wife had already immigrated to the Fallowfield area in 1837, and they and their husbands may have been instrumental in finding the monies that were sent to Ireland to pay for the passage of Michael and Ellen with their children to Canada. Naturally, it was to be expected that Michael and Ellen would head for the area where his wife's sisters were living (and apparently more prosperous) rather than to New Brunswick where the Maloughneys were having a difficult time.
9. It is known that the early Moloughneys could not read or write, and it could be of course that they just lost track of each other through the years and did not know where to go to find each other.

Whether or not Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan lying at rest in Belledune were in fact the parents of the Michael Moloughney that started the line in Fallowfield remains hidden in history. There is no way of confirming the actual relationship. However, it can be said that the Church Records of most of the Parishes in Northern Tipperary were thoroughly checked, and the only Patrick and Mary that appear in the history of 1834-50 are those of the Parish of Boverlahan and these are the people that are buried in the cold, wind-swept cemetery of St. John

the Evangelist Parish, in Belledune, New Brunswick.

The church records that were searched included:

What brought Patrick Maloughney and Mary Ryan to Canada is also open to speculation. It is known there was a famine in the year 1827 that swept parts of the Province of Munster and Patrick and Mary may have been swept across the ocean as a consequence of the troubles.

By the early 1800's, timber from the Maritimes had become an important British import and many Irish emigrants were able to cross the Atlantic in the holds of timber ships that were returning to the Maritimes for another cargo. Along the banks of the Miramichi and its tributaries was one of the finest timber stands in the Maritimes. Timber ships docking at the ports of Chatham and Newcastle on the Miramichi after 1815 brought with them hundreds of poor Irish who often found initial employment loading lumber for the European voyage. Many of these immigrants eventually left for the United States, but others stayed, and after a period in the woods or on the wharves, sometimes turned to farming.

It is believed that Patrick Moloughney, his wife and son, settled on the Miramichi when they first arrived in Canada but after a fire burnt out their holdings, they and others in the region moved farther north along the shoreline. Some of the Miramichi Irish stayed in Bathurst - but Patrick Maloughney moved on to Belledune and the first confirmed record of his presence in Canada dates from 1828 when he apparently settled in the Belledune area.

He took up squatter's rights, and, in July of 1834 he filed the following Petition with the Land Office of the Province:

To His Excellency Major – General Sir Archibald Campbell, Baronet,
Lieutenant/Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of New
Brunswick

The Petition of Patrick Maloughney Humbly Sheweth

That he is desirous of purchasing a lot of land in Belledune on which he has resided five years and improved largely thereon, being advanced in years and having no male children to assist him in tilling or clearing his lot has been the chief cause that he had not been able to pay for his land before now. He therefore prays that the half of his lot viz. one hundred and twenty-five acres, may be allowed him at present, with the front surveyed by Deputy Harley, and he pledges himself to pay the whole of an installment for the two hundred and fifty acres next fall which he would be now enabled to do if he had not lost one hundred and seven barrels of potatoes this spring through means of a dry rot.

And as in duty-bound Will ever pray

(signed) Patrick Maloughney

(N.B. no date shown; believed to have been submitted in July, 1834 - WJM)

The important point to note here is that he claims he had been in the area for five years, and this would place his arrival as 1829. The other point to note is that he states that he has no male children and possibly may have been stretching the truth somewhat in order to make the best case possible. Whatever the reason, however, he was not successful as evidenced by a further Petition that was filed with the Land Office on Apr 16, 1842. This Petition reads as follows:

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir William M. B. George Colebrook Lieutenant-Governor and Commander-in-Chief for the Province of New Brunswicke

The Petition of Patrick Maloughney of Belledune in the County of Gloucester, Farmer,

Most Humbly Sheweth,

That your petitioner has been several years settled upon a tract of land at Belledune, aforesaid, on which he has made extensive clearing, erected House and Barn, and has a numerous family --- That in the year 1834 he was advised by Michael Harley and Marcus Scully, then Deputy Surveyors of Land in that county, to petition for the same and the said Scully drew a petition to the Crown for the said Land and took charge of the same for petitioner - and it appears to have been

"entered in the Land Office and approved in July 1834" that the said Michael Harley was at the time in the habit of receiving money from applicants for lands by virtue of his office, as the people understood it and your petitioner paid him six pounds on account of the said application. Bad crops and other misfortunes rendered petitioner unable to pay any further sum until the present Spring, and on application at the Land Office the agent informed him that "there is no record of the money having been received at the Land Office" and that it can not be allowed to him, and that no further money can be received on his application until it be reviewed by further order or approved.

Your petitioner humbly considers that the money so paid by him to an accredited agent of the Land Office ought to be allowed to him in the purchase of the Land and hopes that Your Excellency's favourable consideration may be extended towards his case that he may be permitted to complete his purchase at two shillings per acre payable down allowing him for the six pounds already paid.

Gloucester County - The petitioner Patrick Maloughney came this day before me and made oath that the several matters and things in this petition contained are just and true - at Bathurst this ninth day of April, 1842.

The petition herein mentioned is herewith endorsed, but there is no memorandum nor entry in this Office to show whether the 6 pounds had been paid to Mr. Harley and no such amount appears to have been paid into this Office by Mr. Harley. The land is surveyed, vacant, and the price approved of by the Lt.-Governor in 1834 was 2 shillings per acre down or 2/5 by installments.

Summary - Patrick Maloughney wishes to purchase 125 acres of land in Beresford Gloucester & to be allowed credit for 6 pounds which he states he paid to Michael Harley about 8 years ago. Rec'd at Land Office April 16, 1842

May 11/42 - Complied with @ 2/1 per acre down the 6 pounds paid to Harley cannot be allowed.

Patrick Maloughney (note spelling) therefore became the legal owner of the property only as of May 11, 1842. In the meantime, he had already carried out the purchase of property

adjoining the land on which he was unintentionally "squatting". On Aug 3, 1841 he had purchased adjoining land from James Hendry that was described as follows:

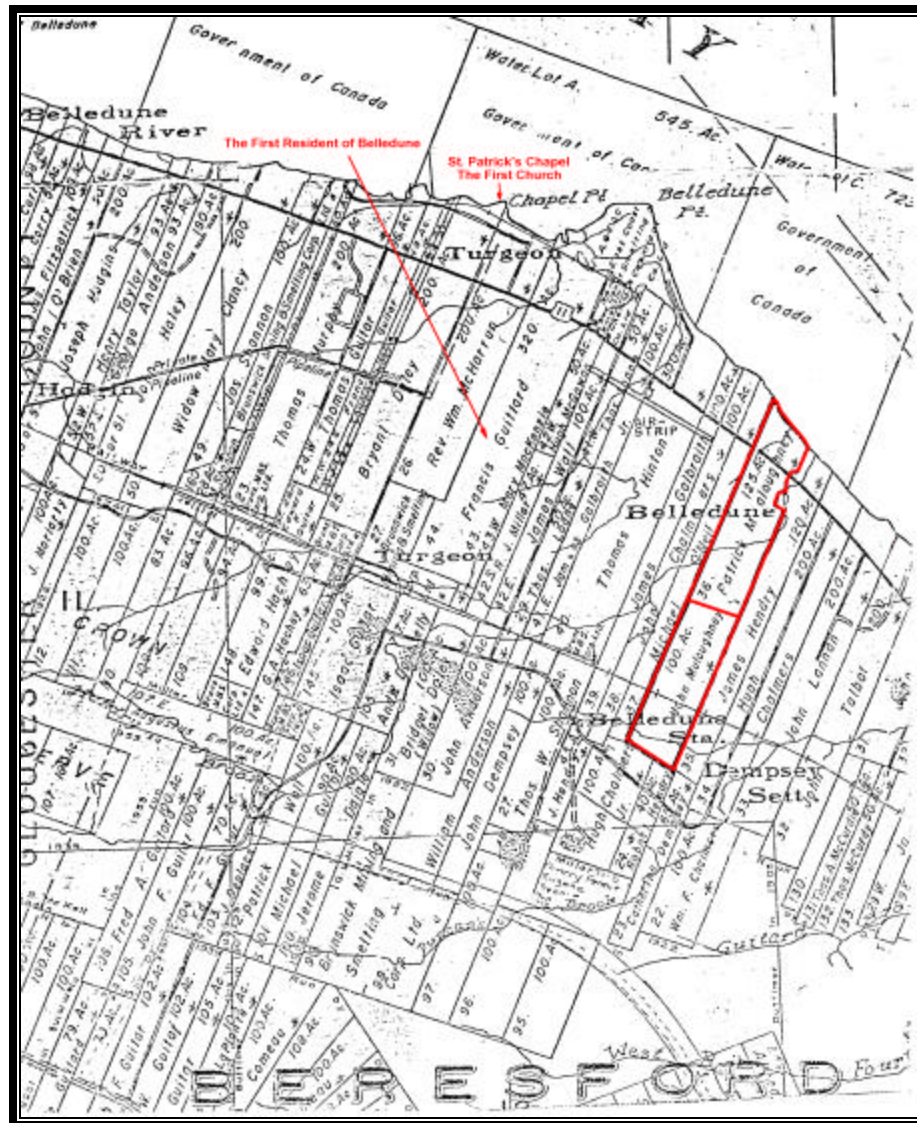
NO. 516. Gloucester County. This Indenture made this third day of August in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty one between James Hendry of the Parish of Beresford in the said County of the one part and Margaret his wife and Patrick Malaughney of the said place of the other part Witnesseth that the said James Hendry and Margaret his wife for and in consideration of the sum of one pound currency of the Province of New Brunswick to him in hand well and truly paid by the said Patrick Malaughney at and before the sealing and delivery of these presents the receipt and payment whereof they do hereby acknowledge and themselves to be therewith fully content satisfied and paid have granted bargained and sold and by these presents do grant bargain and sell unto the said Patrick Malaghney his heirs and assigns all and every part of his grant of land which lays to the northward and westward of the following boundaries namely to commence with the shore or bank at a cedar stake two rods and six feet to the southward of the northeast angle of his grant thence south forty nine degrees west forty six rods and two feet to a birch tree in the brook thence south eighty two west thirteen rods and five feet thence south sixty five degrees west seven rods and two feet to a large stone thence south nineteen degrees west twelve rods and three feet to the edge of the brook thence south fifty degrees east five and one foot to meet the main boundary line which divides the lots belonging to the said James Hendry and the said Patrick Malaughney with all its members privileges and appurtenances to the said piece of land belonging or in anywise appertaining with the reversion and reversions rents issues and profits thereof and of every part and parcel thereof with their appurtenances. To have hold occupy and possess the same and every part and possession thereof unto him the said hold occupy and possess the same and every part and possession thereof unto him the said Patrick Malaughney his heirs and assigns for- ever In witness whereof the said James Hendry and Margaret his wife have hereunto subscribed their names and set and affixed their names and set and affixed their seals on the day and year first herein before written, James Hendry (L. S) Margaret (L. S) Signed sealed and delivered in the presence of N.B. The words and by these presents do grant bargain and sell interlined were inserted previous to the signing of the deed Thomas Loane. Glo. SS. Before me P. J. N. Dumaresq Esquire one of Her Majestys Justices of the Peace in and for the said County personally appeared the within named grantor James Hendry who declared that he signed sealed and delivered the foregoing deed of conveyance to and for the several uses and purposes therein mentioned and contained and at the same time ap-

peared Margaret Hendry the wife of the said James Hendry who being by me examined separate and apart from her said husband or any other person whatsoever.

The property on which Patrick Moloughney settled was subsequently enlarged by his son John through the acquisition of adjoining land; these lands remained in the family down

through the Fifth generation. The location of the property is shown below. In the census of 1861 and 1871 their neighbours were the Breins (Bryn) and the Moriartys (Moriety) - all of Irish extraction, (Elizabeth the youngest daughter of John, married one of the Moriarty boys). The land was subsequently purchased by the Brunswick Mining and Smelting Company. The original house is still there; and for many years it was occupied by members of the Boulay family who rented from Brunswick Mining Company.

In November of 1976 a discussion was held with Mr. Boulay then in his 90's (b. 1883). Mr. Boulay had been a long-time resident of the area and was able to recall an instance in the late 1800's when his life was saved by the alert thinking and quick action of John Maloughney. At the time Mr. Boulay was about 15 years of age and John Maloughney close to 80. Mr. Boulay was raking for kelp on the shore and got himself trapped under the rake as the tide started to rise. Mr. Maloughney saw what was happening from afar, and recognizing the imminent danger took immediate action to rush to Mr. Boulay's help and to free him from the rake. To this day Mr. Boulay considers that John Maloughney saved his life at that time.

Assuming that Patrick Maloughney was born in 1781, then he would have been somewhere around 47 when he and his wife left Ireland for Canada in 1828 - his wife Mary the same age. They brought only John with them and did not have any more children on this side of the water. Mary Ryan lived in Canada for only 16 years after leaving Ireland, dying on Dec 25, 1844 at the age of 63. Patrick lived for approximately 25 years in Canada and died on May 29, 1853 at the age of 72. The spelling on his tombstone is MOLOUGHNEY. Subsequently the spelling was changed in everyday practice, when the next generation in New Brunswick began to spell it MALOUGHNEY". The following provides such detail as is available at this time in connection with John Maloughney and his descendants.

7.1.1 John Maloughney - Born 1818 near Cashel, County Tipperary, and emigrated to Canada with his parents sometime around 1827/28. At that time he would have been 9 or 10 years of age and the baby of the family. There were at least three other children in the family - Mary born in 1813, Catherine in 1815 and Thomas in 1818 but they did not come to Canada with the family. It is likely that he also had at least one other brother, Michael Moloughney (1809), and he probably had as many as three

others who immigrated to the United States. For more information on Michael Moloughney and his descendants see Section 1.0; for more information on potential brothers see "The Moloughneys of Syracuse".

John Maloughney married Bridget Curry about 1847 (deduced). Bridget Curry was born in New Brunswick in 1827 (Census) and died March 7, 1872 at age 45 (tombstone). She is buried in Belledune.

John Maloughney operated the family farm after the death of his father in 1853 and he himself died Mar 4, 1900 at the age of 82 (tombstone). The spelling of the family name on the tombstone is "MALOUGHNEY". He is buried in Belledune. There were six children of the marriage of John Maloughney to Bridget Curry

- 7.1.1.1 Patrick Maloughney** Born 1848 (Census); first child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; named after his paternal grandfather; he had left home by 1871 since he does not appear on the Census Roll of that time. He went west to Butte, Montana and there is no further record of his movement.
- 7.1.1.2 Thomas Maloughney** -Born May 30, 1850 (Church Records - Vol. II, Page 9) second child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; he was still at home in 1871 - but he subsequently followed in the footsteps of his brother Patrick and went west to Butte, Montana; no further record of his movements.
- 7.1.1.3 William Maloughney** - The third child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; born March or April 1853 (Church Records Vol. II, Page 34); he was the third of three sons and the only one to remain at home on the farm. Sometime around 1882 he married Julia Foley of Pokeshaw, New Brunswick. Julia was born in 1860 and died Mar 27, 1939, age 74. (Church Records - Vol. IV, Page 49). William Maloughney died on April 17, 1906, at the age of 53 (Church Records - Vol. III Page 32) - of a heart attack. He and his wife had eleven children - John, Mary Bridget, Joseph Patrick, Thomas, Madge A., Violet Martina, John Francis, Catherine Alice, Bernadette, William Andrew, Annie Regina, four of whom became nuns and one became a priest. At the time of his death the children ranged in ages from 5 to 21 years old. The spelling on the tombstone in Belledune is

MELOUGHNEY – apparently a stonemason's error.

MR. WILLIAM MALOUGHNEY 1906

The death occurred on Tuesday morning, the 17th April, at his home in Belledune, N.B., of one of the most respected citizens of the community in the person of Mr. William Maloughney. His death was due to heart trouble. He was a native of Belledune, and was fifty-three years old. He was a man of sound religious principles, a devout Catholic, and always contributed according to his means. By his kind and genial ways he made hosts of friends, by whom he will be remembered for a long time. His wife and ten children mourn a kind husband and loving father.

The funeral service was held in the parish church of Belledune on the 19th of April at nine o'clock, and was largely attended by persons of every denomination and by members of Branch 130 of the C.M.B.A. of which he was a member, showing in what high esteem the deceased was held by all. The Rev. Father Van de Montet celebrated the requiem Mass. The deceased was a subscriber of the True Witness for over twenty-five years. R. I. P.

- 7.1.1.3.1 John Maloughney - born Nov 3, 1884 (Church Records - Vol. II, Page 133); first son of William Maloughney and Julia Foley; named after his paternal grandfather; died Jan 25, 1885 (tombstone).
- 7.1.1.3.2 Mary Bridget (Mamie) Maloughney - born Nov 23, 1885 (Church Records- Vol. II, Page 141); first-born daughter of William Maloughney and Julia Foley; named after her maternal grandmother; she was the eldest living child of the family at the time of her father's death; on July 2, 1910 she entered the Convent of the Sisters of Mercy in Portland, Maine at the age of twenty-five; took the name of Sister Mary Pascal; died Mar 17, 1952 in St. Joseph's Hospital in Bangor, Maine, at the age of sixty-seven. Her obituary was as follows:

The funeral of Sister Mary Paschal Maloughney was held from St. John's Church, Bangor,

ME on March 19. Rev. William Maloughney, C.S.C., a brother of Welland, Ontario, was celebrant of the Solemn High Mass of Requiem, assisted by Rev. James Sullivan, St. Theresa's Parish, South Brewer, deacon, and Rev. James Clancy, St. Mary's Parish, Bangor.

In the sanctuary also were Rt. Rev. Edward Ward, D.P., St. Mary's, Bangor; Very Rev. Thomas Nelligan, Orion; Rev. Thomas Moriarity, Brewer; Rev. Wm. McDonough, Ellsworth; Rev. Joseph Daly, Brownville; Rev. Lionel Thibodeau, Etonington; Rev. Joseph Butler and Rev. Richard Harvey of St. John's; and Rev. Stephen Mulkern of St. Mary's, Bangor.

Sister Paschal who entered the Sisters of Mercy in 1910 at Portland, leaves to mourn besides Father Maloughney, Sister Mary Emerita, St. Mary Convent, Bangor; and Sister Mary William, Madigan Hospital, Houlton; Joseph, Belledune, N.B.; Thomas and John of Regina, Sask.

- 7.1.1.3.3 Joseph Patrick Malougney – born Mar 15, 1888 (Church Records - Vol. II, Page 160); married Augusta (Gussie) Hayes (Born Aug 18, 1901 died Mar 3, 1982) at New Mills, New Brunswick on Nov 11, 1930. He worked the family homestead until his death on Jan 11, 1963 at the age of seventy-four (Church Records, Vol. V, Page 2). He and his wife had one son, Michael. His obituary was as follows:

BATHURST (Special) - Funeral service for Joseph Patrick Maloughney, 74, who died at Hotel Dieu here, was held at the Church of St. John.

Mr. Maloughney was born at Belledune, son of William and Julia Maloughney. He was one of the prominent farmers in the area, and had been active in community and agricultural organizations.

Surviving are his wife, the former Augusta Hayes. of Benjamin River, N.B.; a son, Michael; a brother, Thomas of Regina; and two sisters, Sister Emerita of St. Francis Xavier Con-

vent at Bangor, Me., and Sister Mary William of St. Joseph's Convent at Portland, Me.

Honorary pallbearers were T.J. Loane, Alphonse Fournier, T.H. Chalmers, William Curry, William Killoran and Horace Boulay. Active pallbearers were John Doucette, Arthur Fournier, Norman Ellis, George Culligan, Thomas Hayes, R. A. Fleiger.

- 7.1.1.3.3.1 Michael William Maloughney - only son of Joseph Patrick Maloughney and Augusta Hayes, born Aug 22, 1933; married Elizabeth Ann Gaudet on Sept 2, 1963 at St. Augustin, Moncton, New Brunswick. Three daughters:

- 7.1.1.3.5 Madge Maloughney - born Mar 1, 1889 (family bible) twin of Tom; didn't marry; died Mar 20, 1912 (family bible), age twenty-three.

The sad death of Miss Madge Maloughney took place at the home of her uncle, Mr. Joseph Foley, Pokeshaw, on March 20, 1912. The deceased young lady was 23 years old and has been ailing for some time. She was a general favorite of all who knew her. She was a daughter of the late Mr. W. Maloughney of Belledune. She is survived by the following relatives: her mother, two sisters and four brothers. The sisters are Sister Mary Paschal of the Convent of Mercy, Deering, Maine; Sister Maloughney of the Hotel Dieu, Chatham; Misses Alice, Bernadetta and Annie. The brothers are Joseph, Thomas, John and Willie. The funeral took place on Saturday, the 23rd at Grand Anse Church and was largely attended. Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. S. J. Doucett. The pallbearers were James Hurley, Robert Cushing, Frank Welton, Will Crowley, Ernest Sisk and Dan Sisk of Pokeshaw.

- 7.1.1.3.8 Catherine Alice Maloughney - born Dec 20, 1894; entered the Sisters of Mercy Convent in Portland, Maine on Sept 21, 1922, at the age of twenty-eight; took the name - Sister Mary Emerita; in 1926 was with the St. Joseph's Convent of the Order in Portland; in 1952 was with St. Mary's Convent in Bangor, Maine; in 1963 was with the St. Francis Xavier Convent of the same order.
- 7.1.1.3.9 Bernadette (Etta) Maloughney - born Aug 6, 1897 (Church Records - Vol. II,

Page 222); married Joseph MacDonald of Bathurst, New Brunswick on Oct 16, 1922; died in childbirth on Sept 27, 1926, at age twenty-three - leaving her husband and one son.

McDonald - The death of Bernadette Maloughney, wife of Joseph McDonald, of Bathurst, occurred on Monday, Sept. 27. It was very sudden and unexpected. The deceased was 29 years old. She leaves to mourn besides her husband and little son, Ronald, her mother Mrs. Julia Maloughney, of Belledune, N.B., three sisters and four brothers. The sisters are Sister Mary Paschal and Sister Mary Emerita of St. Joseph's Convent, Portland Me., and Miss Anna, a graduate nurse now at home. The brothers are Joseph of Belledune, Thomas and John of Imperial Sask., and William of the congregation of Holy Cross, who is studying theology at Quebec. The funeral of Mother and baby girl was held from her late residence, Church Street, Bathurst. The many beautiful bouquets and floral offerings testify to the high esteem in which the deceased lady was held. May her soul rest in peace.

7.1.1.3.9.1 Ronald Maloughney - born 1923

7.1.1.3.10 William Joseph Maloughney - born Feb 4, 1899 (Church Records - Vol. II, Page 229); graduated in 1922 with a Bachelor of Arts Degree from St. Joseph's University, and then entered the Congregation of the Holy Cross in 1923; pursued his theological studies at Laval University in Quebec and was Ordained Jan 23, 1927; was well known throughout Canada and the United States; taught in different Universities; spent fifteen years at St. Joseph's College, Memramcook; later loaned to the American Province of the Holy Cross Congregation and taught at Notre Dame University in South Bend, Indiana; in the last nine years of his career, taught at Kings College in Wilkes Barre, Pennsylvania; held a Doctorate Degree; died Sept 15, 1962 at the age of sixty-three in St. Joseph's Hospital, Saint John, New Brunswick where he was visiting at the time.

A widely known member of the Congregation of Holy Cross, Rev. Dr. William J. Maloughney CSC, Vice-Provincial of the Anglo-Canadian Province of the Sacred Heart, with headquarters in Montreal, Que., died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Saint John, N.B., early Saturday evening. He was 63.

Father Maloughney will be remembered by hundreds of former students at St. Joseph's University at St. Joseph where he taught the English-speaking course for more than 15 years.

Born in Belledune, Gloucester County, May 4, 1899, the son of the late William and Julia (Foley) Maloughney, he was educated in local schools before going to St. Joseph's University for his classical studies. He graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree in 1922.

He entered the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1923 and pursued his theological studies at Laval University, Quebec.

He was ordained to the priesthood on Jan. 23, 1927.

He was appointed to the staff of St. Joseph's in the fall of 1927, when Rev. H. A. Vanier, CSC was serving as superior of the university.

After leaving St. Joseph's University, Father Maloughney went to the famed Notre Dame University, South Bend, Indiana where he taught for some years before going to the staff of Notre Dame High School in Welland Ontario. Prior to being appointed Vice-Provincial of the Congregation in July of this year, Father Maloughney had been teaching at Kings College in Wilkes-barre, Pa.

He went to Saint John in mid August to make his annual retreat with the Holy Cross Fathers at the Villa Madonna Retreat House at Torryburn. He was taken ill on Aug. 20 and had been a patient in hospital since that time.

His ordination took place in Famed St. Josephs Oratory.

Father Moloughney received a Doctorate in theology from Laval. One of three members of the Family in the religious life, he is survived by two sisters, Rev. Sister Mary William, Mary Emerita, Bangor Me. Portland Me. and Rev. Sister both members of the Sisters of Mercy; two brothers, Joseph P. Maloughney, Belledune, Gloucester County and Thomas W. Maloughney, Regina Sask. As well as three nephews and a niece.

The body was taken to St. Joseph N.B. where funeral services were held on Tuesday morning at St. Thomas Church with solemn high mass of requiem at 10. Internment was in religious plot in St. Thomas Cemetery.

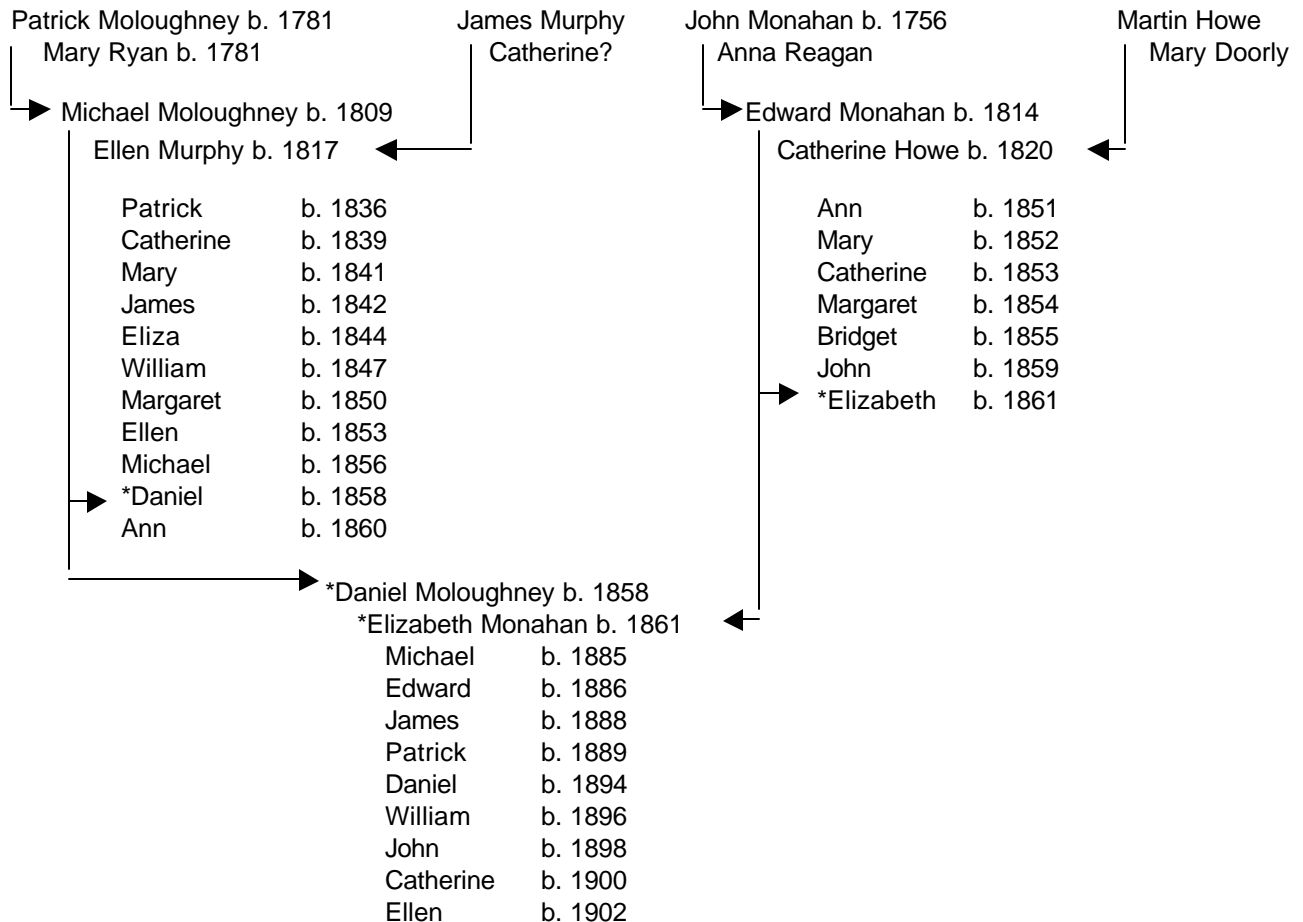
Among those attending the funeral were Mr. And Mrs. Joseph Maloughney, Michael Maloughney and Rev. O. Parker all of Belledune.

- 7.1.1.3.11 Annie Regina Maloughney - born Sept 4, 1901 (Church Records - Vol. III, Page 6); became a nurse and subsequently entered the Convent of the Sisters of Mercy in Portland, Maine on Dec 8, 1932 at the age of thirty-one; took the name of Sister Mary William; in 1952 was with the Madrigan Hospital in Holton, Maine; in 1963 with St. Joseph's Convent in Portland, Me.

- 7.1.1.4 Mary Maloughney** - The fourth child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; born Aug 1855 (Church Records - Vol. II, Page 44). She is listed in the Census of 1861 and 1871 - but there is no further record after that time. She went to Boston where she married a Williams and apparently raised a large family.
- 7.1.1.5 Catherine Maloughney** - Born 1857 (Census); the fifth child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; there are no Church Records for Aug 1857 to July 1863 - having probably been destroyed by fire (affidavit to this effect is found on page 65, Vol. II of the Church in Belledune). She is listed on the Census Roll of 1861 and 1871, and subsequently went south to Boston where she married a Denton and raised a sizeable family.
- 7.1.1.6 Elizabeth Maloughney** - No information is available as to date of birth; presumed to be the last child of John Maloughney and Bridget Curry; she married a Moriarty and farmed land immediately adjacent to the Maloughney homestead in Belledune.

7.2 Relationship of the Fallowfield and New Brunswick Maloughneys

In Irish genealogy there is a family custom in connection with the naming of children that enables one to trace the descendants of each branch of the Tree. Usually the first-born son is given the name of the paternal grandfather; the second son - the name of the maternal grandfather, and each succeeding son is given the name of one of the uncles (a brother of the father). In connection with the girls, the tradition is to give the first-born the name of the maternal grandmother, the second the name of the paternal grandmother; and each succeeding daughter is given the name of an aunt (a sister of the mother). The case of Dan Moloughney (born 1858) and his family can be used to demonstrate the practice:



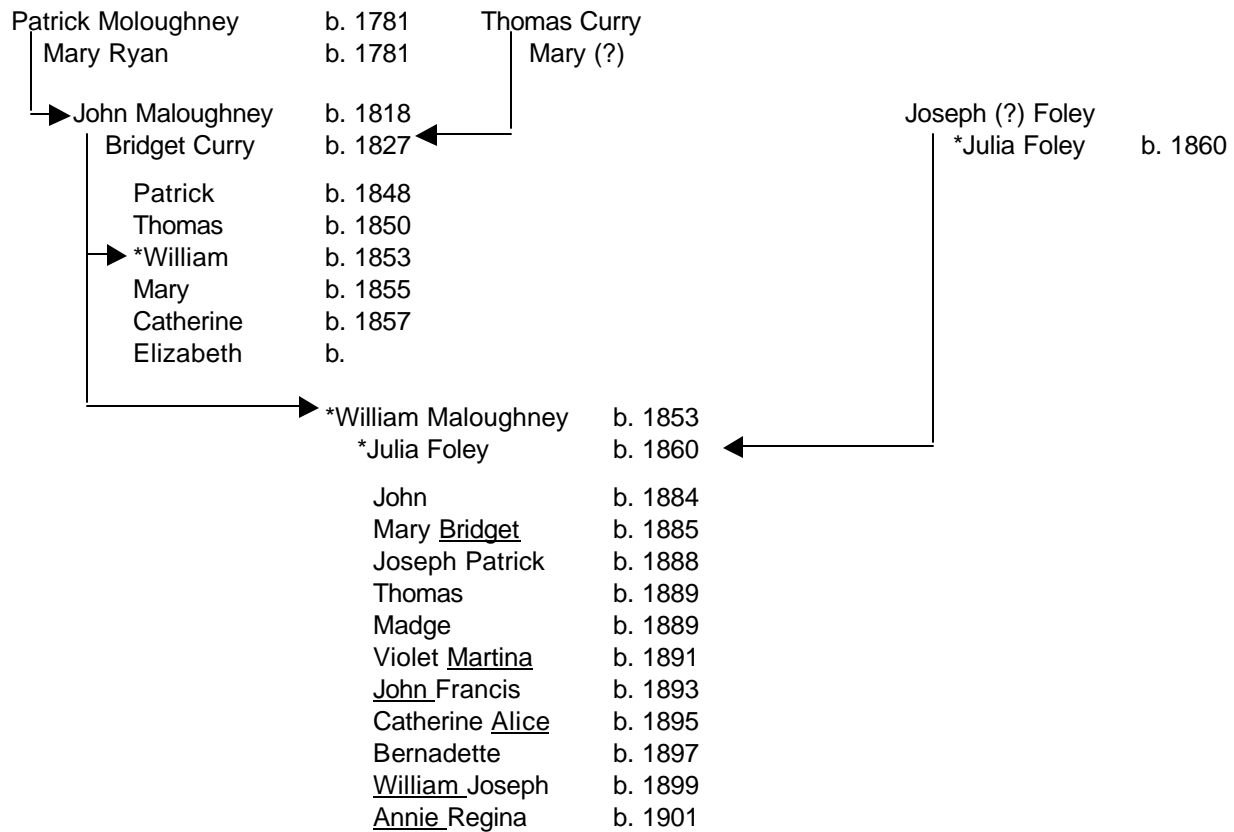
Dan Moloughney's first son was named Michael after the child's grandfather on his father's side; the second son was called Edward after the child's grandfather on his mother's side; the third son was called James - after an uncle of the child; the fourth son was also

named after an uncle; the fifth son was named after Daniel the father; the sixth son was named after an uncle. At that point Daniel Moloughney did not have any brothers left whose names he might use for his male children - and at this point they named the seventh son John, after a brother of the mother. The first female child was called Catherine and was named after the child's grandmother on her mother's side, the second female child was named Ellen after the child's grandmother on her father's side.

Extending this tradition backwards leads us to the names of the parents of Michael Moloughney and Ellen Murphy. Since their first son was called Patrick, then the paternal grandfather of the child would have been Patrick Moloughney; since the first female child was called Catherine, then the maternal grandmother of the child would have been Catherine; the second boy was called James, and the maternal grandfather of the child would have been James Murphy; the second female child was called Mary and therefore the paternal grandmother of the child would have been Mary. This indicates that the parents of Michael Moloughney would have been Patrick Moloughney and Mary (?) and the parents of Ellen Murphy - James Murphy and Catherine (?).

By deduction, a further bit of history can be assumed. We have established on the basis of family tradition that the parents of Michael Moloughney would have been Patrick Moloughney and Mary (?). We have also established from the history of the New Brunswick branch of the Moloughney Tree that the parents of John Moloughney were Patrick Moloughney who settled in Belledune (born in Ireland - 1781) and Mary Ryan (born in Ireland - 1781). It would seem quite possible therefore that this couple, Patrick Moloughney and Mary Ryan, could be the parents of both Michael Moloughney as well as John Moloughney - since Michael Moloughney was about 19 years of age at the time they sailed for New Brunswick he may have decided to remain in Ireland and not to move with them. They also left behind them at least three other children of whom we have no further record, - Mary, Catherine and Thomas.

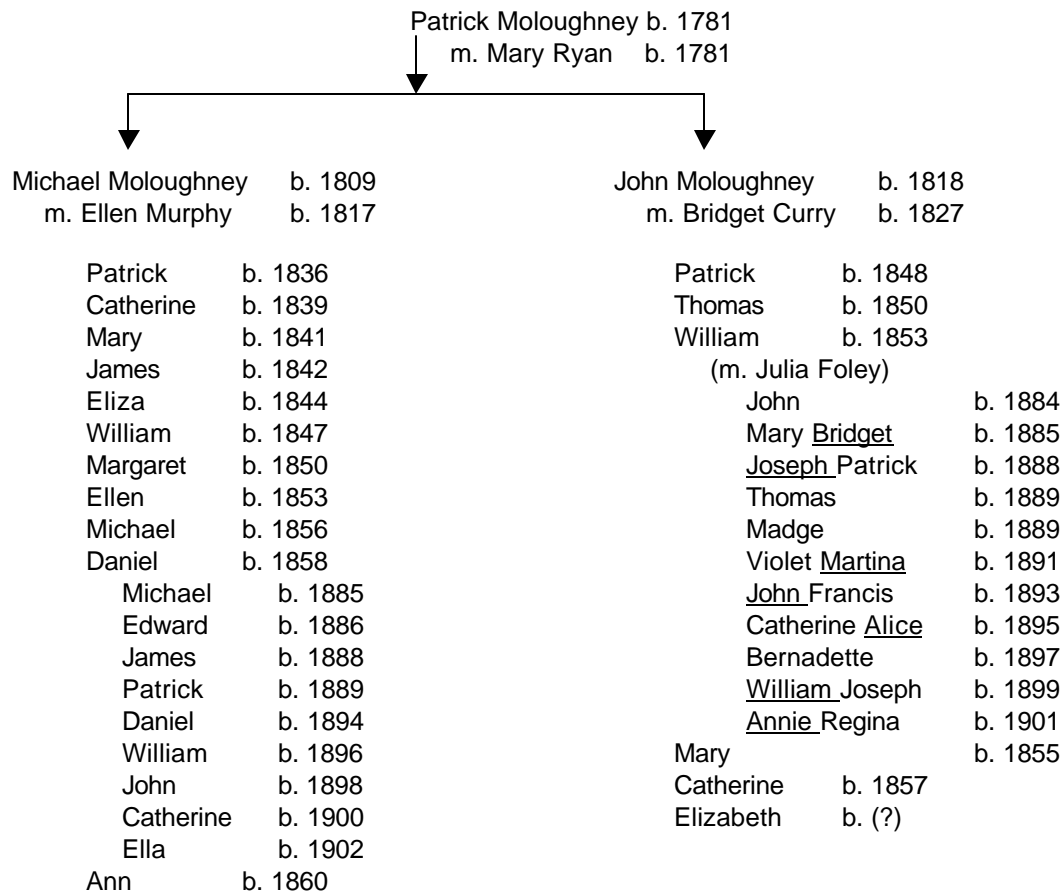
The Chart of the New Brunswick branch of the Tree shows the same family tradition in connection with the naming of children.



John Moloughney (born 1818) named his first-born son Patrick after the child's paternal grandfather; the first-born female child was called Mary, after the child's grandmother.

In the family of William (1853) the first-born son was named John after the child's paternal grandfather; the first-born female child was called Mary Bridget (Mame) after the child's grandmother.

The similarity of names in each of the families of the New Brunswick and the Fallowfield branches of the Moloughney Tree, as well as the actual names of the first-born in each case suggests quite strongly that Patrick Moloughney and Mary Ryan were the parents of Michael Moloughney (1809) and John Moloughney (1818). The relationship was possibly as follows:



Unfortunately, there are no church records to substantiate the relationship. It can be definitely stated that they certainly were related – but the degree of relationship cannot be confirmed.
