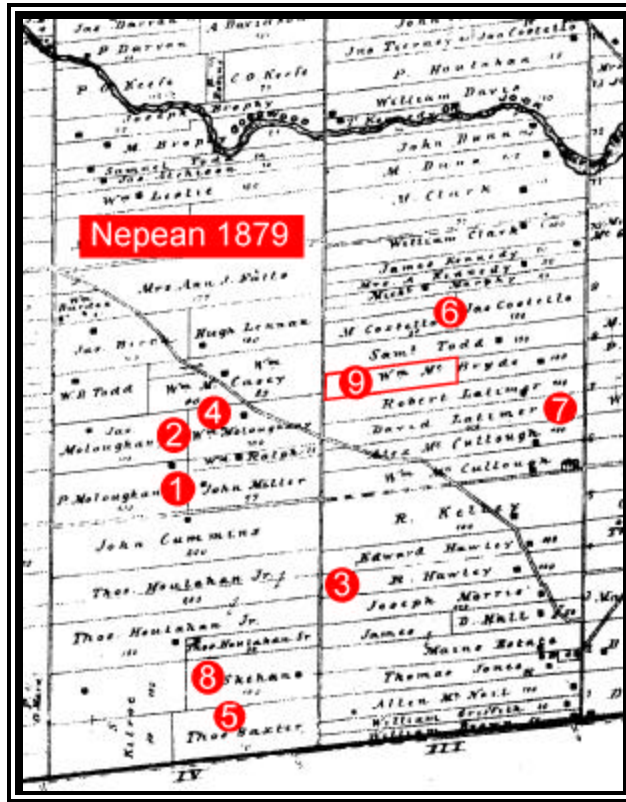


# Elizabeth Moloughney Hawley

## 1.5 Eliza Moloughney (1845- )

The third daughter (fifth child) of Michael Moloughney and Ellen Murphy. Born March 17, 1845 on Urra Hill, Ireland; baptized in St. Patrick's Church, Parish of Killodiernan,

Village of Puckane, Co. Tipperary; sponsors were William Hogan and Mary Hogan. She immigrated with her parents to Canada at age 5. She grew up on the family homestead, the East-half of Lot #7, Concession #4, Nepean Township, Ontario.

On February 8, 1866 in St. Philip's Church, Richmond, Ontario, she married Johnny Hawley (son of Roderick Hawley and Anne Kennedy); witnesses were Roderick Hawley, his brother, and Mary Costello a first cousin of the Bride. He was about 30 and she 21. Johnny Hawley came from a neighbouring farm (Lot #6, Concession #6). His parents were married in Ireland and brought with them five children when they emigrated to Canada in 1835; two more children were born in Canada, for a total of seven all told: Michael, Edward, Anne, John, Roderick, Mary-Ann and Thomas.

After their marriage, Liza and Johnny moved to Renfrew County. Four chil-

children were born in the next four years: Michael 1867, Roderick 1868, Ann 1869, and Ellen 1870. Misfortune struck them after several years of homesteading - their barn caught fire while the men were away at the shanty, and burned to the ground. The family moved again. They pulled up stakes and moved to Minnesota (?) – where they raised a big family, approximately eight children: No further information has been developed on this line.
