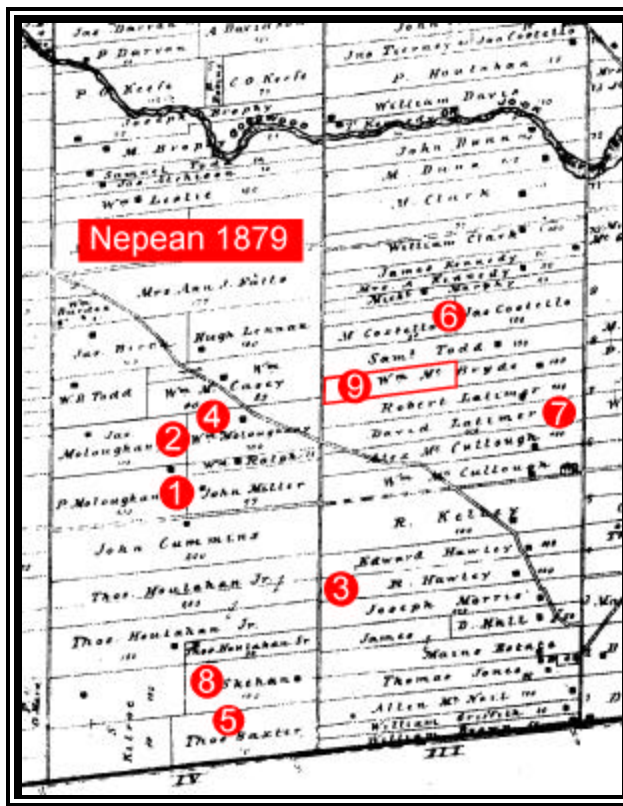


James (Jim) Moloughney

1.4. James (Jim) Moloughney (1842-1921)

Second son, (fourth child) of Michael Moloughney and Ellen Murphy. Born April 10, 1842, on Urra Hill, Ireland; baptized in St. Patrick's Church, Parish of Killodiernan, Village of Puckane, Co. Tipperary; sponsors were Daniel Moloughney and Honore Hogan. He emigrated with his parents to Canada at age 8. The home farm was located on the East-half of lot #7 Concession #4, Nepean Township, Carleton Co. The family settled there in 1850. Jim grew up on that farm but spent many winters in the "shanty" where he rose to be foreman.

Jim had a limited education - while there was a schoolhouse on Concession #3, Lot #6 not too far away, Jim had problems with his school teacher and spent only 3 days in school, according to family history. He had a fight with the teacher, threw an inkwell at her, and that was the end of his school days! He could not read nor write - but became good with figures. He made his fortune in the lumber industry.

Squared white pine was the chief item of lumber exported from Canada for much of the 1800's. In 1863, one of the peak years for the square and 'flatted timber' trade, a total of 424,999 pieces went through the slides and booms of the Ottawa River, according to one Government report.

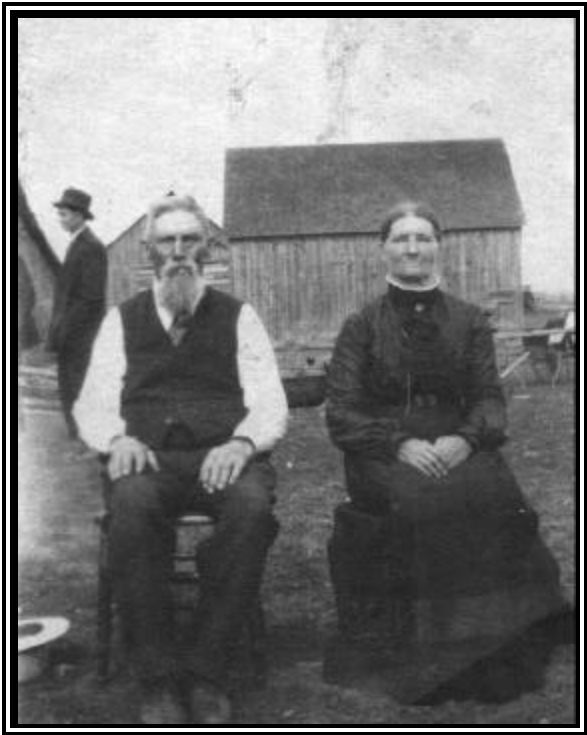
Jim was a hard worker. He took advantage of the opportunities and soon he had risen to the job of foreman, looking after 50 to 60 men in each of several shanties that were

part of his camp. It was a responsible position; the men were largely cut off from the outside

world until the creeks began to break up in the spring. Over the years, he brought each of his four brothers “up the Opeongo” with him to work in the shanty, as well as some of his nephews - quite often with a team of horses to give them better pay and a less strenuous job. His nephew Bill (Dan’s son) was killed when kicked in the head by a horse (Jan 5, 1916).

When Jim was 27 his father bought the adjoining West-half of Lot 7, Concession #4 from the Crown. The Register of sale is dated April 10, 1869 - and the purchase price for the 100 acres was \$435. The money was finally paid in full by early 1873 and on July 11 of that year Letters Patent were given to his father to provide full legal rights. The neighbouring farm (lot #6) had already been purchased for his brother Pat. This one was earmarked for Jim - and it was left to him outright when his father died in 1875. The will had one provision - Jim was to pay \$500 to his brother Mick another beneficiary under the Will.

On Oct 31, 1877 Jim married Mary Monahan (later his brother Dan was to marry her sister Elizabeth). Mary was the daughter of Edward Monahan and Catherine Hough. Her father was already dead. The witnesses to the marriage were William Moloughney his brother and Catherine Monahan her sister. For more information on Mary Monahan see section 6.0 “The Monahan Story”. Jim was 35 at the time of his marriage and his bride 23. They had one child only - a daughter Ellen (Nellie) born on December 16, 1878.

Without any sons to work the land they finally had to sell the farm when they reached the later years of life. They moved into Ottawa in April of 1921 when Jim was 78 years of age and his wife 66. On March 29, 1921 the farm was turned over to Milton H. Bratton for the sum of \$4000. They acquired a house at 27 Louisa St. in Ottawa - but were not long to enjoy the benefits of City living. He died on Oct 13, 1921 at the age of 79 - and she died the following March 29, 1922 at the age of 67. They had 44 years of marriage, both are buried in Notre Dame Cemetery, Ottawa. They had one child.

1.4.1 Ellen (Nellie) Moloughney - born Dec 16, 1878, sponsored by Mick Dourley, an uncle and Anne Moloughney, an aunt; married William Patrick Collins (Apr 8, 1881 - Dec 26, 1938, son of Matthew Collins and Elizabeth McKeever).

Her parents' substantial estate was left to Ellen in its entirety, and she subsequently set out on a trip to the 'Old Country' in 1922. The family Bible records Jim's birthplace as County Tipperary, with no further information. Based upon this lead Ellen was able to successfully trace his birthplace. Proof of this was turned up during a trip to Ireland in September of 1976. In the prized possessions of Joe Hanlon of Puckane, a man then 80years of age, there were found many photographs of "Cousin Nellie" taken during the time she spent with him in Puckane. Apparently she had arrived first of all in Nenagh, and after several days had been lost she was finally directed to Puckane where she uncovered the baptismal record of her father, and met Joe Hanlon. Her stay was extended from one week to three! More than fifty years later, Joe Hanlon still had a series of photographs taken of her during the course of her stay with them. Joe was still a bachelor in Sept of 1976, at the age of 80. Ellen returned home, and subsequently married Bill Collins in 1933 - she was 55 and he 52.

Ellen (Moloughney) Collins and Bill Collins did not have any children. As a consequence, this line of the Moloughney family died with the death of Ellen on May 31, 1935, two years after her marriage to Bill. Bill died on Dec 26, 1938. Bill and Ellen are both buried in Fal-lowfield, Plot #18.

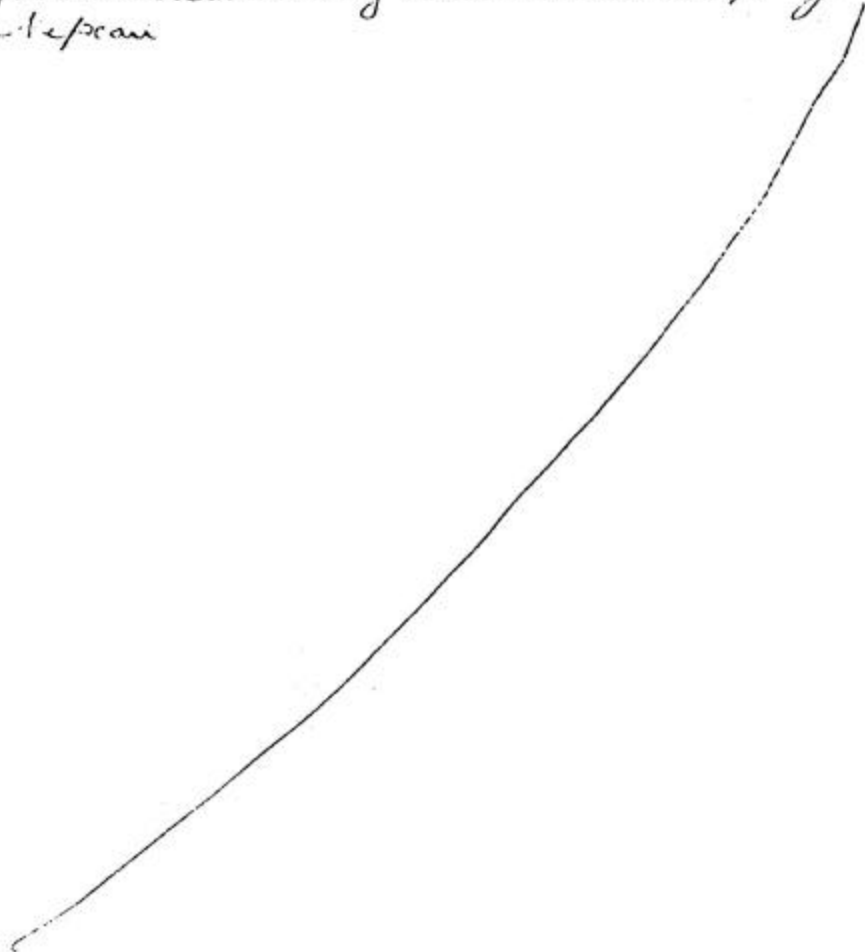

Witnesseth, that the said parties of the first part, in consideration of the sum of
one dollar of lawful money of Canada,
to them in hand paid at or before the sealing and delivery hereof (the receipt whereof
is hereby acknowledged,) hath granted, bargained, sold, and quit-claimed, and by their
present doth bargain, sell, and quit-claim, unto the said party of the second part, and his
heirs and assigns forever, all their right, title, interest, claim, property, estate and demand,
both at law and in equity, and as well in possession as in expectancy, of, in, and to all
that certain parcel or tract of land and premises, situate, lying and being in the
Township of Keppan in the County of
Carleton and Province of Ontario, Dominion of Canada,
containing by admeasurement one hundred acres
be the same more or less; and being composed of

The West half of Lot number seven in the fourth Concession of the said township of Apsara



To have and to hold the same with all and singular the hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging unto the said party of the Second Part and his heirs and assigns forever, in as full, large, and ample a manner as the said party of the First Part might have held the same had the said Indenture never been executed.

In Testimony Whereof the parties to these presents have hereunto set their Hands and Seals the day and year first above written. (In duplicate.)
